Religious Nationalism Conference

Nationalism (June 16-18, 2025) brought together leading scholars from across disciplines to examine the global resurgence of religious nationalist movements. Keynote speakers Pantelis Kalaitzidis (Volos Academy), Cathleen Kaveny (Boston College), and Charles Mathewes (University of Virginia) anchored discussions that ranged from Orthodox contexts in Greece and Russia to contemporary American Christian nationalism and Jewish nationalism in Israel. The conference featured fifteen speakers from institutions including Notre Dame, Cambridge, Union Theological Seminary, and the University of Athens, offering interdisciplinary perspectives from theology, political science, psychology, and sociology. Papers examined themes including the psychology of nationalist movements, the relationship between religious and territorial claims, and the impact of religious nationalism on democratic societies. The robust discussions reflected the timeliness of this critical topic as religious communities worldwide grapple with questions of identity, belonging, and political engagement.


